- e2e (Entry to Employment). Not ready for work, training or a course? Not sure what you want to do? Your PA can refer you to e2e. It is a personal programme based on your needs and interests and will help you to move onto the next stage

- ✎ Personal strengths and weaknesses.

- ✎ Expected exam results and what teachers think you will achieve.
- ✎ What is available to you, where you can do it.
- ✎ To have a back-up plan and apply for more than one option.

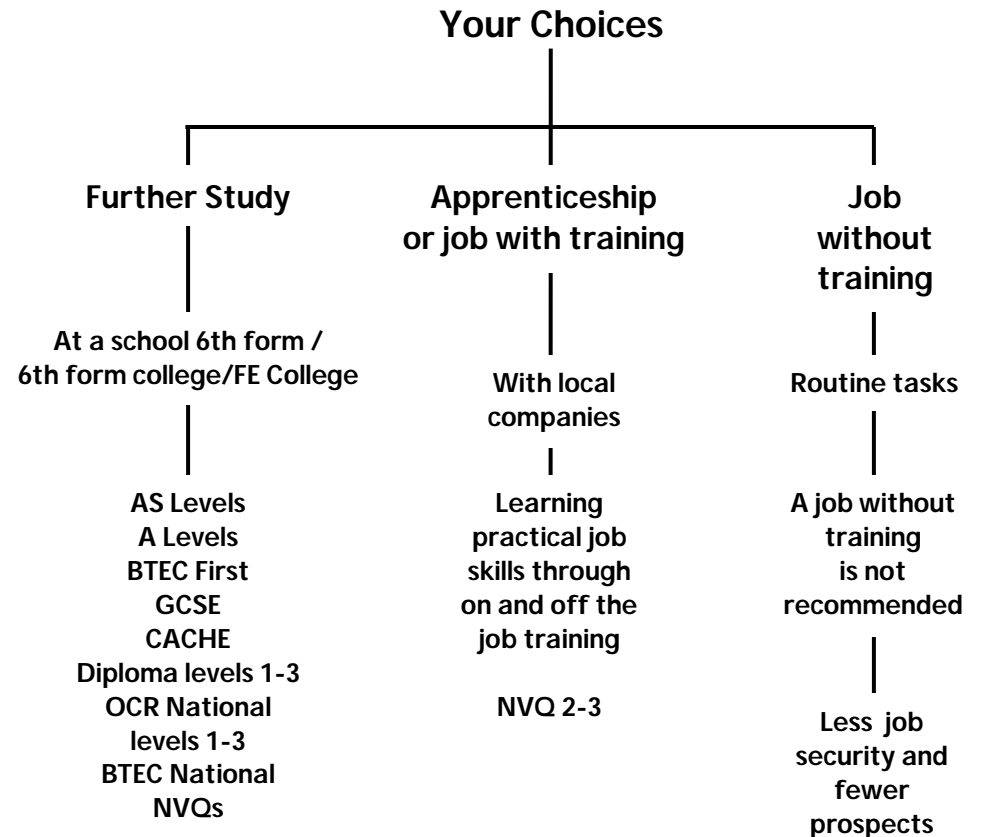

Fast Guide to Options at 16+



OPTIONS

This leaflet is to help you to decide what will be the best option for you. It will make you think about what is important to you.

6th FORM or COLLEGE

Why study further? So you can:

- continue studying a subject you are enjoying or have enjoyed in the past
- take up a new subject/s, learn new skills
- improve job prospects
- go on to higher education
- develop personal skills
- delay looking for a job
- keep your options open and give you more time to decide exactly which career you want to go into in the future.

Where to study?

- 6th Form College
- College of Further Education
- School 6th Form

What to study?

- NVQs - for job specific skills in areas such as catering, hairdressing, childcare
- AS Levels /A Levels - in **academic** or non-vocational subjects such as English, history, psychology, and **applied** subjects like health and social care, engineering, business, leisure and tourism
- Vocationally-related qualifications such as BTECs, OCR Nationals or Diplomas in subjects such as art and design, health and social care, ICT, Business.

Where could it lead?

- Higher education
- Employment at a higher level

Money for learning

If you're under 19, fees will be paid for full-time education.

You may be able to get an Education Maintenance Allowance (EMA) - a means-tested allowance of up to £30 a week in term time.

JOBS WITH TRAINING and APPRENTICESHIPS

Why choose an apprenticeship or job with training? So you can:

- train in work for lots of jobs including construction crafts, childcare engineering crafts, motor vehicle work and office work
- learn on the job for at least four days a week
- continue studying (either in a college or with a local training provider), for one day a week and work towards National Vocational Qualifications (NVQs) levels 2 and 3
- get paid a wage or, if you are a non-employed apprentice you can apply for an EMA (see above).

JOBS

Why go straight into a job? So you can:

- start work as soon as possible - you may have had enough of full-time education for the time being
- start earning a wage
- get experience and training

You may be able to get day-release to obtain further qualifications.

Think about:

- what career prospects you would have within this company
- what if you decide to move on?
- the training
- the fact that it is more difficult to get training for lots of jobs when you are older if you don't get them 16-19.
